Gazette as occurring at Truro Cathedral on Christmas Eve, 1878. The Bishop of Truro, Edward Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury, formalized the service with Nine Lessons for use at Christmas Eve, 1880. It was a hit with over 400 people attended the service that year. There is a popular, if apocryphal, legend that Bishop Benson created the service in order to lure wayward souls out of the public houses and into the Cathedral on Christmas Eve. If this is so, then the Bishop enjoyed some considerable success. By 2013 there were 1,500 in attendance for the service. (Attendance at the pubs during these services are not recorded.)

The service is enjoyed throughout the Anglican Communion, as well as by other denominations, but is particularly popular in schools and colleges where it is often the primary Christmas observance each year. The Groton School in Groton, Massachusetts, is the oldest and longest continually held Lessons and Carols service in the United States, having been conducted there since 1928.

The most widely known Lessons and Carols is the annual BBC broadcast from King's College Chapel at Cambridge University in England, with millions of listeners held each Christmas Eve. The King's College service has been broadcast since 1928, even in the depths of the Blitz, despite fears of attack, with the stained-glass windows removed and the heat turned off due to war rationing.
